Andrew Scheer, Denise Batters, Scott Moe will all attend Pro-Resource Rally Feb. 16 in Moosomin

Federal Opposition Leader Andrew Scheer, Saskatchewan Premier Scott Moe, and Saskatchewan Senator Denise Batters will visit Moosomin on the February long weekend to speak at a pro-pipeline, pro-resource rally.

The rally will take place Saturday, February 16 at the new IJack assembly plant just north of Moosomin on Highway 8.

The rally will start at 11 am sharp, and will be followed by a barbecue.

Brandon-Souris MP Larry Maguire, Dauphin-Swan River MP Robert Sopuck and Saskatchewan MLAs Steven Bonk, Warren Steinley, and Warren Kaeding have all confirmed that they will attend the event as well.

The plan for the rally grew out of efforts by the town and RM of Moosomin to bring discussion of Energy East back to the national agenda.

The town and RM submitted parallel resolutions to SUMA and SARM last winter to ask those organizations to raise the issue with higher levels of government. The town

and RM then appointed former SARM president Sinc Harrison to take the lead on the issue.

"The voice of the silent majority needs to be heard," says Harrison. "Polls that have been done across Canada show there is support for pipelines. To sit back and do nothing is unacceptable, so we will do what we can."

"We were very fortunate to have the Leader of the Opposition, and then Senator Batters, and then the Premier of Saskatchewan agree to come speak at the rally. Hopefully that will help attract the national media, because we want to get our message out to the whole country."

"It took a lot of work by a few people to secure Andrew Scheer as a speaker, but because of his national profile, our event should get a lot of attention, and we want that attention because we have a message that we want to get out to the country—that for places like Moosomin, where people are familiar with pipelines, where people know what pipelines are all about, there's a lot of support for pipelines."

Did he think the group would be able to attract such high-profile speakers?

"I'm an eternal optimist," he says. "When we started on this, we were very hopeful that we could bring in some speakers of a very high calibre. To have Andrew Scheer here and Premier Moe and Senator Batters is what we hoped for. We're still hopeful the premiers of Manitoba and New Brunswick will be able to come as well. When I found out Premier Moe was coming, I reached out to him and asked if he could speak with those two premiers, and he said he would."

Invitations had been sent to the premiers of Alberta, Manitoba, Ontario, and New Brunswick to attend, but the Ontario and Alberta premiers have declined.

Harrison said planning for the rally has gone well so far. "The committee that's been working on this has been wonderful to work with," he said. "We have had lots of enthusiasm, we've had lots of people offer to help in the community and we've had financial contributions from outside the area. It's amazing how well this has come together."

"The fact that we have the IJack building—a brand-new building that's associated with the oil industry—will help a lot. Dan McCarthy at IJack has been very accommodating and good to work with. The good thing about the location is we have a quarter section of parking, so parking shouldn't be an issue. We hope that everyone who has concerns over the future of pipelines and our oil and gas industry can come out and have their voice heard."

He said he expects a large crowd for the rally, but how large is anyone's guess.

"It could be 500 or it could be 5,000," he said. "If it's 5,000, we'll have to set up some speakers outside!"

What does he see as the ideal result of efforts to bring attention to the crisis in getting resources to market? "The first thing would be that the Senate would reject Bill C-69. The second would be that Trans-Canada would reconsider their application to the National Energy Board, and Energy East would get under way, and the Trans-Mountain Pipeline would get under way."

The three speakers should have a lot to say about the oil and gas industry and pipelines.

In a 2018 interview with the World-Spectator, **Andrew Scheer** said he supports pipelines. "There is still a market in eastern Canada for western energy," he said.

"I don't believe that motorists in Quebec or Ontario or Atlantic Canada are happy that they are importing oil from other countries."

"There are tankers full of oil coming up the St. Lawrence into eastern refineries."

"They killed the (Energy East) project because, as you mentioned, the Trudeau Liberals changed the regulatory process to include both upstream and downstream emissions."

"It's the only sector of our economy that is now subject to that complete double standard and a standard that is not applied to oil being imported."

"I believe that by removing those conditions and by repealing C69 we could show the investors and companies that you have a government that is going to be a champion of the sector, and hopefully they would come back to the table, so I do think that is possible. Energy East was one of those grand nation building projects that would have brought our country closer together."

"It had support in Atlantic Canada, support in Quebec and Ontario outside of the political realm. Many people in the economy outside of government knew that would be great for the economy, and I think that we could create the conditions for a win on that in a Conservative government and not with the Trudeau Liberal government."

Premier Scott Moe has spoken on the importance of the oil and gas industry to Saskatchewan.

"This is an industry that creates wealth for all Saskatchewan people and all Canadians, and an industry that we need to support across this country, and we need to speak and speak loudly," he said at the Rally 4 Resources in Regina in January.

"There are some headwinds coming from our federal government," he added.

Senator Denise Batters has spoken on the importance of defeating Bill C-69.

"We know the oil industry downturn, which has devastated Alberta, has also harmed Saskatchewan's economy," she said at the Regina rally.

"We are fighting for pipelines, and for resources development, and against Trudeau's do-nothing, costly carbon tax," she told the crowd at the Regina rally.

Oilfield trucks welcome


Oil and gas companies, pipeline workers and contractors are welcome to bring their trucks and line them up along the North Service Road north of the Trans-Canada Highway.

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Trivia Challenge will be fundraiser for Legion

If all goes as planned, 19 teams will compete in the Moosomin Legion Trivia Challenge on Saturday, March 30 for a chance to win a \$250 gift card donated by the Red Barn.

The event is a fundraiser for the Moosomin Legion, with all proceeds going towards the Legion's Metal Art Memorial project, which memorializes all of the soldiers on Moosomin's cenotaph. Each soldier's photo and story is mounted on a metal plaque that will hang in the Legion. The Legion is hoping to raise enough money with fundraisers and donations over the next year to have all of the metal art memorials done by Remembrance Day.

Donna Lafleur with the Moosomin Legion says the Legion decided to hold the Trivia Challenge because they thought it would be a fun way to raise money.

"It's something new and something different," she says. "It's not a supper, and usually that's what we've had is suppers and lunches, whereas this is something totally off the wall, totally different, new and interesting. If it really flies it may become an annual event if the interest is there."

"We are hoping to raise at least \$5,000 minimum. That would give us another 25 prints."

Lafleur saw how the Trivia Challenge worked at another event in town and said it looked really fun.

"It can be anything from sports to geography to current events, whatever category he (the host) makes up," she says. "You have a 25 per cent chance of being right just by guessing, because it's A, B, C or D. You don't have to know the answer. It's not like jeopardy where you have to give the correct response."

"This is more for fun. And it involves anybody," Lafleur says even minors can be on teams, as long as they are accompanied by a parent, as alcohol will be served at the event.

Trevor Kerr with Sound Stage Music will be the host for the event. Kerr says he started doing game shows and trivia challenge events about six years ago, and they've been a hit ever since.

"It's similar to a Jeopardy style game," he says. "So we set the teams at maximum of six people and they will be at their own table, and questions will appear up on the screen, and they have different point values just like on TV. And the contestants will all have a wireless buzzer at their table and they'll lock in the answer right from their table."

Kerry says he comes up with the questions and categories himself, and he does each event from scratch so that people who have been to his events before don't have an unfair advantage.

"I'm not totally sure what categories we are going to have," he says. "They are going to be random categories that I pick myself. What they are going to be I'm not totally sure yet. It's going to be a surprise for me and everyone else! They literally can be absolutely anything."

Kerr says anything from sports to history to geography general knowledge can be included.

"At the end, the top two teams are going to play off in a special bonus round for the championship for all the money," he says. "The top two teams are going to make the final and they will go head-to-head on who ultimately is going to be the champion for the night."

Kerr says there has been a lot of interest in trivia events lately.

"This year for Christmas parties, it was game show season. There were 12 or 13 game shows and we did only two straight DJ Christmas parties. It is a big part of the business. And we love it. I have a co-host and host it myself. It's fun, it's interactive, it's something different. I enjoy it and I hope people pick up on that and sense my excitement and

have some fun with it as well."

A maximum of 19 teams can sign up. Teams can have a minimum of four and maximum of six contestants. Lafleur says people are welcome to come watch, even if they are not on a team. The entry deadline is March 15 and teams can enter by phoning or texting 306-434-9340 or emailing csm435@hotmail.com.

From health care to first year university to trades: Let Southeast College be your next step in education

Electrician Applied Certificate Moosomin

The Electrician Applied Certificate in Moosomin will be starting in the fall of 2019. Always a popular course, this 18-week program usually fills up every year.

"The Applied Certificate program is equivalent to a Level 1. Once completed, students can go out and secure employment, register with Saskatchewan Apprenticeship and then start working towards their Level 2," says Onrait.

"Our course in Moosomin is one that's almost fully subscribed, meaning we have 12 spots available in that course and it's almost always full. That is one we always have very high numbers on."

Why is the course so popular every year?

"I think it's a really, really great location because Moosomin is a couple hours from Brandon and a couple hours from Regina," says Onrait. "It captures those rural students in both southeastern Saskatchewan as well as southwestern Manitoba. I think it's also the fact that that program is such a longstanding program as well. We've been in Moosomin for as long as I've been at the college, so I think that it has a really great reputation, and our instructional staff in Moosomin have always been really strong as well. And of course we have really good student supports in Moosomin as well, right from our campus manager to administrative support and, of course, our student advisor in Moosomin is fantastic."

Continuing Care Assistant Certificate Whitewood & Weyburn

"This is another longstanding program," says Onrait. "It will be a fall start for that program as well, and this one is a little bit longer, it's a 32-week program. That combines the hands on learning as well, as there is practical clinical learning with the Continuing Care Assistant Program."

"Students are placed on practicums throughout the area, and when they finish they are fully qualified Continuing Care Assistants, so they are eligible to go work in care homes and home care. Those are usually the most common positions post-course with the Continuing Care Assistant Program."

"Our health-care programs across the board, across the college, have been really well attended for the last few years, showing us that there is a need for health care positions and health care education in southeast Saskatchewan."

"I think the fact that it's been in White-



wood for so long helps, and again it's one of those courses where we are almost always full.

"This one draws from quite a wide area. I know in the past we've had students from Whitewood, from Moosomin, from Wolseley, from some of the First Nations communities that are located in that Whitewood area."

"It's just a nice central location to be able to offer that program."

First-year university classes Moosomin

This fall marks the third year that the College will be offering first-year university classes through the University of Regina, and Onrait is excited about how well this has gone over.

"We usually don't find out that until just about May or June exactly what classes we are going to be offering, but it will be similar to what we have offered in the past," she says. "We are having really good success with it, so we don't anticipate a whole lot of changes. Sometimes one odd class will change, but for the most part the core classes have remained the same the past two years."

Onrait says interest in the first-year U of R classes appears to be growing.

"Last year we had about 10-12 students for full-time and part-time across our region. This year we've doubled. We have approximately 18-20 students this year. That's very exciting."

"I think it just shows that the word is getting out there, that you can take your first year of university close to home, that there are advantages to taking that first year in a smaller setting in a smaller facility with a really close-knit cohort of students. There is the small class sizes, you always have a student advisor there if you're having a challenge with anything."

"I think that the bonus of having that unique setting is really getting out into our communities, and I think that's why we're attracting more and more students to the first year of university classes."

"I think it will keep growing. It's like anything—the first year you offer a program your attendance usually is good but not fully subscribed, and then your next year it grows a little bit more, then your next year it grows a little bit more."

"We're definitely looking forward to growing and expanding our first-year

university programming."

Entrance Scholarships

One thing the college is excited about every year is the amount of guaranteed entrance scholarships they offer. This year the college is offering \$75,000 in Southeast College Entrance awards to full-time program students for 2019-2020.

"Most of the money for scholarships is raised through our fundraising events—through our fundraising golf tourna-

ments and then our matching amounts through the Saskatchewan Innovation and Opportunity Scholarship Fund," says Onrait.

"This year we have \$75,000 in entrance awards to give away to full-time post secondary as well as full-time university students, so students need to apply early because there is not quite enough to cover everyone should we be fully subscribed come fall. So students need to apply early, and the earlier the better."

"They do need to apply before June 30 and be accepted into their program area before June 30 in order to be eligible for those scholarships. They are eligible for \$500 for a full-time post secondary program, and it is \$500 per semester for a university student taking a full course load."

"There is no application needed. Just by submitting your application for a program, you're automatically eligible to receive those Southeast College entrance awards. We make it easy."

"Entrance awards are usually distributed in about the first week of December, so it's always really nice for students to get that entrance award just before they break for Christmas."

"And then of course there is another \$120,000 to \$130,000 that we award in application based scholarships and bursaries, merit based scholarships and bursaries, and that gets done about mid spring."

"For a small institution, we really have a lot of scholarship opportunities for students. We've had students that have come out of our educational facility with full-ride scholarships, and they have had everything reimbursed."

"So there really is a great opportunity, because you are talking small numbers of students, so there is lots of opportunity for students to have a chance to have most of their education paid for by coming Southeast College."

Engineering and the applied sciences represent a rewarding area of study that blends creativity and imagination with the science and mathematics of design and problem solving and the human factors of personnel and resource management, planning, and organization.

If you're interested in designing solutions to life's problems, big or small, then engineering just might be the program for you!

WHAT IS 'SYSTEMS' ENGINEERING?

Systems engineering places the practice of engineering in the context of the systems in which designs operate. An education in systems engineering prepares students to work in the broader context of multi-disciplinary, team design required of modern engineers.

In systems engineering, students learn to design in ways that account for the social and environmental impacts, end-of-life decommissioning, and resource management associated with a given project. Thus, designing a step ladder, for exam-

ple, takes into account not just the ladder itself, but how its manufacture will impact the environment, whether or not it is recyclable, and the application of software to develop the most financially, environmentally, and ergonomically effective design, and so on.

PETROLEUM SYSTEMS ENGINEERING

Petroleum Systems Engineers evaluate oil and gas reserves, develop methods for surface collection and for increasing reservoir production, perform oil and gas treatment, and adapt petroleum technologies to extraction of other important minerals.

They also contribute to activities such as pollution remediation and greenhouse gas reduction.

Our PSE program teaches evaluation, design, application and management with respect to petroleum engineering. Advanced computer utilization and automation are also key components of the program.

WHAT OUR STUDENTS DO

All engineering students take a common initial core program consisting of the basic maths and sciences needed by all engineers, plus introductory design courses.

Our PSE students learn to evaluate oil and gas reserves; design well drilling, completion, workover, production, and surface facilities; analyze reservoir performance for production optimization; perform advanced reservoir simulation and visualization; develop new techniques to enhance oil recovery; and conduct modern reservoir management.



Social Innovation Lab brings students and businesses together in real world learning environment

It was with great excitement that I registered for the Social Innovation Lab at Canadian Mennonite University (CMU). This practicum course operates in partnership with CMU's Centre for Resilience, a sort of think tank and incubator that is home to several civic-minded social innovators, entrepreneurs, and researchers. Comprised of students from a diverse set of degree programs including Business Administration, International Development Studies, and Psychology, the social Innovation Lab matches students with social enterprises to identify and address real world business issues.

The projects we are working to solve are no less diverse. In small teams we have been partnered with different organizations and businesses, and using service design methods, we identify problems, research influencing factors, brainstorm solutions, test hypotheses, and evaluate our results. We have the opportunity to bring our own creativity to the work we do.

One of the organizations I am partnered with is Sultehom. This fledgling social enterprise will build homes

out of shipping containers. The plan is to hire former gang members as employees to provide them with work experience and skills. This transition into healthier lifestyles. Sultehom is in discussion with CMU to build their first show home on the campus grounds.

For Sultehom, the major project we are working on is developing partnerships to construct the prototype show home and assess its cost structure. Currently, the only materials not pledged are windows, doors, and furniture. Once these are secured, construction costs can be assessed for CMU. Our challenge as students is finding individuals and organizations that support our mission. As the project progresses our task will shift to honoring the generosity of our donors.

Another organization I am working with is Compost Winnipeg, which provides residential and commercial composting services in the city. Compost Winnipeg is expanding and plans to break ground on a new composting facility at CMU in 2019. The company will use an eco drum in-vessel composter to tightly control the

compost process.

Our first task on their behalf is researching community opinion about having a compost site at CMU. Generally, the benefits of composting are known and supported; however, any concerns are important to discover to avoid future conflict. Working with, not against, the community is our goal as we consider communication and public relations strategies as part of Compost Winnipeg's larger expansion plan.

Through the Centre for Resilience and the Social Innovation Lab, CMU offers students a unique opportunity to apply classroom lessons and gain real world experience that will help when I enter the work force. It is highly engaging to work with such diverse and passionate people.

I anticipate a semester of learning and growth beyond what traditional classrooms can provide. I am excited to think about what we will accomplish.


Andrew Vercaigne, who is pursuing a Bachelor of Science (Agribusiness), said one of his favourite parts of his university experience is serving on student council.

SUNTEP recruiting for fall 2019

The Gabriel Dumont Institute of Native Studies and Applied Research (GDI) is the educational arm of the Métis Nation-Saskatchewan.

The Saskatchewan Urban Native Teacher Education Program (SUNTEP) is a four-year, fully accredited

program, offered by GDI in co-operation with the Ministry of Education, the University of Regina and the University of Saskatchewan. The SUNTEP program was established in 1980 and has graduated approximately 35 to 40 students per year with a Bachelor of Elementary Education.

The program includes a cross-cultural specialization in anti-oppressive and anti-racist education with an emphasis on Métis/First Nations history and culture. A substantial amount of time is spent in schools working with teachers and students. Most of this fieldwork is done in urban centres. The program provides a solid foundation in theories and skills of teaching.

SUNTEP graduates have gained excellent reputations as teachers and role models in schools across Western Canada. Their training combines a sound academic education with extensive classroom experience and a thorough knowledge of issues facing students in our society.

The primary goals of SUNTEP are as follows:

- To ensure that people of Métis ancestry are adequately represented in the teaching profession; and
- To ensure that SUNTEP graduates are educated to be sensitive to the individual needs of all students and those of Aboriginal ancestry in particular.

SUNTEP is a four year accredited Bachelor of Education program offered by GDI in conjunction with the Ministry of Education and the University of Regina. Tuition is fully sponsored for Métis students.

Qualifying First Nation students with band funding are welcome. SUNTEP offers smaller classes, tutoring and counselling support, accessible instructions and an on-campus location.

GDC offers the first two years of classes toward the University of Regina, Bachelor of Arts and Sciences degree with sponsored tuition for Métis students.

Application deadline date for both SUNTEP & GDC is May 1st.

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Radiation therapists—vital members of cancer care

If you are looking for a career that involves patient care in a highly technical environment, then a career as a radiation therapist might be right for you.

Radiation therapy is the use of ionizing radiation to treat a patient with cancer. Approximately 50 per cent of cancer patients will receive radiation treatment at some point during their care. While a radiation oncologist prescribes the treatment, it is planned and delivered by radiation therapists. This makes radiation therapists a vital part of the oncology healthcare team.

Radiation therapists are individuals who have a strong aptitude for adapting to changing technology

as well as effective communication and interpersonal skills. It was Tristan Taylor's second time skating at Nationals, but when the 16-year-old from Wolseley took to the ice this year in St. John, New Brunswick, it was his first time skating as a Junior.

Taylor came in 14th at nationals in the Junior Men's category, a finish he is pleased with, as he considers this his first year getting his feet wet in the Junior category. Last year Taylor skated at nationals as a Novice.

"I was hoping to do better, but I'm not stressed out about it. I've still got a season to improve. I wouldn't say I'm too upset. I'm happy about getting the experience to go to St. John."

Taylor says there's lots to work on as he hones his skills for next year.

"There are a lot of new jumps and combinations," he says. "We will begin to do quads and the triple axel. We've done some training on just my skating in general, and the way I look on the ice is something we've been looking at."

With the exception of skating in pairs at the Canada

Games in Red Deer from Feb. 15 to March 3, Taylor says his competitive season for skating in singles this year is over.

Taylor grew up and lived in Wolseley until he was 10 years old, then moved to Regina where he currently skates with Skate Regina. He still considers Wolseley to be his home town.

He says his ultimate goal as a skater would be to see Olympic ice some day, and after that continue with it as a career in some aspect.

"The 2022 Olympics would be my goal—whether that's in singles or pairs, it's not a big deal to me.

"Once I'm done competing, lots of people who finish competing go to different places to do shows, and they travel on things like cruise ships and do ice shows, so I think that's something I would do post competition, when I'm done competing."
